Do you enjoy driving?



April is Earth Care Month

Plastics are found on the shelves of our stores but they are also litter on our roads, waterways and filling our landfills. Plastics have become a huge problem across the globe, especially since China stopped taking plastics for recycling in 2017. Americans' plastic waste is five times more than the global per-person average making the responsibility for all this waste on us. Plastics are manufactured from oil and gas that are subsidized by our government. There is an equity issue too. Plastic factories are usually located in low-income neighborhoods and communities of color impacting their health and daily lives.

What can we do?

<u>Rethink, Refuse, Reduce, Reuse, Refurbish, Repair, Repurpose with the last</u> <u>option - Recycle</u>

- I. Stop buying plastic. Look for things packaged in glass, metal or cardboard instead; If that is not possible, look for larger containers and refill it; OR simply refuse things like liquid hand soap and use bar soap, usually wrapped in paper.
- 2. Change things like laundry detergent. Liquid laundry detergent is mostly water. Switch to powdered detergent or detergent sheets that dissolve in water.
- 3.Carry your own water bottle. Bring your own shopping bags. Reuse bread bags instead of using ziploc bags. Wash ziploc bags and reuse them.
- 4. Stop using straws unless they are compostable or reusable
- 5. Reduce use of styrofoam take-out containers, cups & dishes which are not recyclable.
- 6.Be an Earth Advocate by speaking about why all of this is important. We have one earth which we need to protect.
